# SCORING METHODOLOGY

The Florida scorecard tracks bills from the committee process to floor votes. While some of these bills had legislation filed in both the House and Senate, others were filed in one chamber only. Each of Americans for Prosperity-Florida's (AFP-FL) legislative priorities is included on this scorecard, as well as additional issues we explicitly supported or opposed during the 2021 regular legislative session. Summaries for all bills and issues and their results during the legislative process are included in the scorecard.


One point has been awarded for each vote cast in support of an issue that removes barriers for society or against an issue that creates new barriers. Each vote carries the same weight, regardless of the issue

or whether the vote occurred in committee or on the floor. Legislators voting on an issue twice and voting in favor of our position both times received a score of 2/2. If they voted against our position both times they received a score of 0/2. We also awarded one point for prime sponsorship of a priority bill we supported, and deducted a point for sponsorship of a bill we opposed.

# BILL DESCRIPTIONS

## SB 72/HB 7 CIVIL LIABILITY FOR DAMAGES RELATING TO COVID-19

*Coronavirus*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Brandes/Rep. McClure*

This past year our knowledge of how the COVID-19 virus operates and how to prevent transmission have expanded dramatically. These bills would give legal protections to businesses that undertook good faith efforts to operate in a manner consistent with best practices for dealing with the virus at the time, preventing frivolous lawsuits for business owners who work to balance providing their services and keeping the doors open to their employees with the need to provide a safe environment. SB 72 was passed by both chambers and signed into law by the governor.

## SB 144 SEARCHES OF CELLULAR PHONES AND OTHER ELECTRONIC DEVICES

*Criminal Justice*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Brandes*

This bill would have banned warrantless searches of cell phones and voice-activated devices. Cell phones and home assistant devices such as the Amazon Echo have become increasingly complex and now contain information such as location tracking and the ability to listen to conversations in addition to texts, emails, and browsing history. Unfortunately, this bill did not pass through its committees of reference.

## SB 166/274 JUVENILE DIVERSION PROGRAM EXPUNCTION

*Criminal Justice*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Perry*

Juvenile diversion programs are intended to provide an alternative path away from the criminal justice system. However, once these youth complete the programs, records of their arrest remain in the public eye, making it harder for them to obtain a job or get into college, along with other collateral consequences. These linked bills would have allowed for the expunction of certain arrest records given the completion of approved diversion programs. Both bills were passed by the legislature and were vetoed by the governor.

## SB 46/HB 737 CRAFT DISTILLERIES

*Employment, Regulations*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Hutson/ Rep. DiCeglie*

To qualify as a craft distillery, the state sets a cap on the how much product a company can make. This bill would increase that cap, allowing craft distillers to increase their production, giving greater access to consumers and empowering these small businesses to thrive. SB 46 passed both chambers and awaits the governor’s signature.



## SJR 204/HJR 1179/HB 1181 ABOLISHING THE CONSTITUTION REVISION COMMISSION

*Legal/Judicial*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Brandes/Rep. Beltran*

The Florida Constitution requires that a constitution revision commission be convened once every 20 years to examine the state constitution and propose any amendments it deems appropriate. However, this is often a politicized process run by members who aren’t voted on and held accountable to the public. These bills would put an end to that process. SJR 204 was passed by the Senate, the House, and signed into law by the Secretary of State.

## SB 2008/HB 1429 TOURIST AND CONVENTION DEVELOPMENT TAXES

*Corporate Welfare*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. Avila*

The Local Option Tourist Development Act gives counties the authority to collect taxes for purposes of promoting tourism. In practice, this equates to corporate welfare, with taxpayers footing the bill for the benefit of private companies working in the industry. This bill would allow these funds to be used for services such as flood management, funneling funds away from corporate welfare and instead into more legitimate governmental functions. Both bills failed to pass their respective chambers.

# BILL DESCRIPTIONS

## SB 400/HB 913 PUBLIC RECORDS

*Open Government*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Rodrigues/Rep. McClure*

The Florida Constitution guarantees every person a right to inspect or copy any public record of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government, unless such record is specifically exempt. The bill prohibits an agency that receives a public record request to inspect or copy a record from responding to such request by filing a civil action against an entity making the request. SB 400 was passed by both chambers and awaits signing by the governor.

## SB 78/HB 947 DUES AND UNIFORM ASSESSMENTS

*Employment*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Rodrigues/Rep. Plakon*

Compulsory association with an organization should not be a requirement to hold a job. As a right-to-work state, Florida has many protections for employees who choose not to join or pay fees to a certain group or union, but additional protections could further enhance those safeguards. These bills ensure public employees provide affirmative consent before joining a union and/or having dues docked from a paycheck. Both bills failed to make it onto their chamber floors, dying in committee.



## SB 152/HB 1145 REGULATORY RESTRICTION REDUCTION

*Regulations*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. McClain*

Red tape and regulations can be among the costliest components of creating or running a business. These bills as originally constructed would create an oversight committee tasked with reviewing and doing away with unnecessary and overly burdensome regulations. While the House version was approved by its first committee, neither made it through the entire committee process nor made it to the chamber floor.

## SB 232 CRIMINAL JUSTICE

*Criminal Justice*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Brandes*

SB 232 contained several common-sense criminal justice components that would reform a system that must balance the need to protect residents of the state while still maintaining civil rights for the accused. One provision would require that certain custodial interrogations by law enforcement officers be electronically recorded to provide an accurate account of statements. While one committee approved the bill, it fell short of final passage.

## SB 246/248 PUBLIC MEETINGS AND RECORDS/ CONDITIONAL AGING MEDICAL RELEASE

*Criminal Justice*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Brandes*

Inmates deserve access to privacy rights even if they are serving time. These linked bills would exempt from public disclosure of certain records and exempt from open meetings requirements portions of public meetings from the related conditional aging inmate release, granting that deserved privacy for sensitive information. While SB 246 was approved by the Criminal Justice Committee, it failed to advance beyond that.

## SB 48/HB 7045 SCHOOL CHOICE

*K-12 Education*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. Fine*

Educational opportunity benefits all children and their parents by allowing students the ability to find an

educational experience that best fits their individual needs and goals. HB 7045 streamlines existing scholarship programs while expanding eligibility, bringing Florida closer to a time when every child can learn in the environment that best meets their needs, regardless of their family income or ZIP code. HB 7045 was passed by the House and Senate and signed into law by the governor.

## SB 402/HB 35 LEGAL NOTICES

*Criminal Justice*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Rodrigues/Rep. Fine*

Government has a responsibility to print notices for the public. However, current law requires many of these notices to be published in local newspapers, an expensive and outdated practice. This legislation would allow for greater usage of notices to be printed online making them more accessible and cheaper. HB 35 moved through the House and the Senate and was signed into law by the governor.

# BILL DESCRIPTIONS

## **SB 84 RETIREMENT**

*Tax and Spending*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Rodrigues*

The Florida Retirement System (FRS) is overleveraged, and current projections warn that if the system continues as is, it will eventually run the risk of being unable to pay retirement benefits for the state's public workers, putting taxpayers at risk of having to cover the gap. SB 84 would seek to reform the FRS to ensure that future public workers would receive competitive retirement benefits while keeping taxpayers from having to cover for poor governmental accounting practices. While the bill was received favorably by the Senate, it failed to pass the House floor.

## **SB 494/SB 768/HB 459/HB 1063 ADMINISTRATION OF VACCINES**

*Health Care*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Burgess/Sen. Baxley/Rep. McFarland/Rep.*

*Fernandez-Barquin*

Under current law, pharmacists are able to administer only certain vaccines. During the COVID-19 crisis, this has prevented qualified medical workers from helping combat the pandemic due entirely to governmental red tape. With these bills, pharmacists would be able to dispense all current approved vaccines including those for COVID-19. SB 768, passed both chambers and awaits signing by the governor, which will help move Florida past this, and other, viruses.

## **SJR 340/HJR 547 SUPERMAJORITY VOTE REQUIRED TO ENACT A SINGLE-PAYER HEALTH CARE SYSTEM**

*Health Care*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. Rizo*

A single-payer health care system would put government completely in charge of your health care, taking away your choices and control, putting bureaucrats in between you and the doctors you trust, and raising your taxes to do so. These bills would require a supermajority vote from the legislature before such a system could be enacted, protecting patient choice and preserving access to quality care. Unfortunately, these bills did not move past the committee process.

## **SB 496/HB 59 GROWTH MANAGEMENT**

*Regulations*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Perry/Rep. McClain*

Established property rights are essential to a free society and government must respect them. This bill would require local municipalities to incorporate these principles into their growth plans and include a property rights element. HB 59 moved through both the House and the Senate and awaits signing by the governor.

## **SB 522/HB 219 VACATION RENTALS**

*Regulations*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. Fischer*

Technology and new advances have opened up the way people travel, including how they find and access their



accommodations, as homeowners can use the internet to rent out their space to prospective clients. This bill would prohibit local governments from further regulating the duration or frequency of these nontraditional rentals, allowing more options in the marketplace. Neither of these bills received a vote on their chamber floors.

## **SB 148/HB 329 BEVERAGE LAW**

*Regulations*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Bradley/Rep. Tomkow*

Under current law, restaurants in Florida are unable to deliver alcohol to residences. SB 148 would allow for delivery of drinks, giving customers greater options in their meals and giving restaurants greater economic opportunities. SB 148 moved through both chambers and has been signed and approved by the Governor.

## **SB 1128/HB 919 PREEMPTION OVER RESTRICTION OF UTILITY SERVICES**

*Energy*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Hutson/Rep. Tomkow*

Energy is a vital component of essentially every piece of modern-day life. It powers our homes, runs our air conditioning, provides for transportation, and many more activities. These bills would stop local municipalities from barring the development of various energy sources, keeping consumers' ability to choose their preference without political interference. HB 919 passed the House and Senate. It now awaits the governor's signature.

# BILL DESCRIPTIONS

## SB 876/HB 631 OPTOMETRY

Health Care

Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. Rizo

Scope of practice refers to the number of services that qualified health practitioners can provide to consumers. These bills would expand the scope of practice for licensed optometrists, giving greater health care access to Floridians and greater ability to practice for health care workers. While both bills advanced through a committee, they ultimately did not make it to their respective chamber floors.

## SB 738/HB 353 BICYCLE OPERATION REGULATIONS

Regulations

Lead Sponsor: Sen. Baxley/Rep. Hage

Bicycles have evolved past their original design, offering different models with different features. Unfortunately, the law has not kept up with these changes and many of these newer machines are technically not allowed by law. These bills would change that, giving greater freedom and choice to consumers. HB 353 was passed by both the House and Senate and signed into law by the governor.

## SB 700/HB 1477/HB 247 TELEHEALTH

Health Care

Lead Sponsor: Sen. Rodriguez/Rep. Melo/Rep. Fabricio/Rep.

Giallombardo

Telehealth allows for patients to receive medical care from the comfort of their own homes, giving greater access to



those who don't have a doctor nearby, access to reliable transportation, or the time for a trip to an office. These bills would expand the services available via telehealth, giving greater health care options to all Floridians. While the bills had some initial success moving through committees, they ultimately fell short of passage.

## SB 266/HB 403 HOME-BASED BUSINESSES

Employment, Regulations

Lead Sponsor: Sen. Perry/Rep. Giallombardo

COVID-19 has had a significant negative impact on the economy of Florida, but that hasn't stopped entrepreneurs from continuing to find ways to start new businesses. These bills would reduce regulation for

home-based businesses, allowing for greater job creation and economic growth as Floridians seek to find new and innovative ways to provide services to the community. HB 403 moved through the House and was approved by the Senate. It now awaits the governor's signature.

## SB 1294/HB 663 COTTAGE FOOD OPERATIONS

Employment, Regulations

Lead Sponsor: Sen. Brodeur/Rep. Salzman/Rep. Botana

Cottage food operations are home-based cooking businesses that provide entrepreneurs the opportunity to make food for customers without the burden of having to buy pricey, and potentially unnecessary, office space and equipment. This legislation would reduce barriers for cottage food owners, allowing for greater job creation and economic growth. HB 663 was approved by both the House and the Senate and will be sent to the governor.

## SB 268/HB 735 PREEMPTION OF LOCAL OCCUPATIONAL LICENSING

Employment

Lead Sponsor: Sen. Perry/Rep. Harding

With nearly 30 percent of Florida's workforce required to have an occupational license to hold their job, there are substantial barriers for many people wishing to practice their skills. These bills would set standardized state requirements, removing additional burdens placed at the local level for contractors. HB 735 was passed by the House and Senate and awaits the governor's signature.

## SB 1032/HB 953 CRIMINAL CONVICTIONS

Criminal Justice

Lead Sponsor: Sen. Perry/Rep. Chambliss

Occupational licenses are permission slips needed from the government to work in certain industries. Many with a criminal record are denied licensure. This creates a two-tiered society and punishes people seeking to get a job and integrate back into society even after their time has been served and their crime doesn't relate to the job itself. Florida has made strides in right-sizing occupational licensing laws to safely provide greater opportunity to those with a criminal record. These bills would, among other things, shorten the time licensing boards can consider certain crimes from five to two years. Both bills failed to make it through the committee process.

## SB 262/HB 29 DISPENSING MEDICATION

Health Care

Lead Sponsor: Sen. Harrell/Rep. Willhite

A physician may dispense up to a 24-hour supply of medication to a patient the physician is treating in an emergency department of a hospital. If the patient needs more than a 24-hour supply, the physician must provide the patient with a prescription. These bills would expand this authorization to allow all prescribers, not just physicians, to prescribe medication upon release and for a time to last through extended weekends or holidays. SB 262 passed the Senate and was approved by the House. It now awaits the governor's signature.

# BILL DESCRIPTIONS

## SB 1028/HB 51 CHARTER SCHOOLS

*K-12 Education*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Hutson/Rep. McClain*

These bills would create an alternate authorizer through the Florida College System to approve the sponsorship of a charter school, allowing for more educational opportunities for parents and their children. SB 1028 was passed by both chambers and has been approved and signed by the Governor.

## SB 1014/HB 835 EMPLOYEE ORGANIZATIONS

*Employment*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Baxley/Rep. Byrd/Rep. Plakon*

Compulsory association with an organization should never be a requirement to hold a job. As a right-to-work state, Florida has many protections for employees who choose not to join or pay fees to a certain group or union, but there are still additional protections that could further enhance those safeguards. These bills ensure public employees provide affirmative consent and before joining a union and/or having dues docked from a paycheck. Both bills failed to make it through their respective chambers.

## SB 1176/HB 855 BARBER SERVICES

*Employment*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Stewart/Rep. Morales*

In Florida, barbers can offer their services only at registered barber shops. This effectively ties barbers to brick and mortar establishments, driving up prices due



to the need to rent office space and reducing access for consumers who might have difficulty traveling. HB 855 will reduce these barriers, allowing barbers to practice their trade in other locations. HB 855 was approved by the House and Senate and will be sent to the governor.

## SB 472 GAIN-TIME

*Criminal Justice*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Bracy*

Gain-time is a term used to refer to how much time an incarcerated individual can shorten from their sentence for maintaining good behavior or completing certain programming. Gain-time is currently capped in Florida at 15 percent, giving fewer incentives to successfully complete programming shown to reduce recidivism. This bill would have increased the cap-limit for gain-time to allow certain incarcerated individuals to earn up to 35 percent off their sentence. SB 472 unfortunately did not have a single committee hearing.

## HB 6011 PROFESSIONAL SPORTS FACILITIES

*Corporate Welfare*

*Lead Sponsor: Rep. Beltran*

Corporate welfare can exist in a number of ways, including providing certain industries carveouts that subsidize their work at the expense of the taxpayer. Professional sports programs are one of the most prominent examples, in which hundreds of millions of taxpayer dollars can be used to support stadiums. HB 6011 would have helped end some of that funding by ending the Sports Development Program, which provides state funding for constructing, reconstructing, renovating, or improving professional sports facilities. Unfortunately, the legislative session ended before HB 6057 was able to receive a vote on the House floor.

## SB 386/HB 557 PAYMENTS TO CLERKS OF THE CIRCUIT COURTS

*Criminal Justice*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Wright/Rep. Lamarca*

In Florida, failure to pay a court fine or fee can result in the suspension of a driver's license. This places thousands of Floridians in a position to either drive on a suspended license or potentially lose their job if other transportation is not available. These offenses create court backlogs and use up prosecutor's bandwidth when greater focus should be placed on higher-risk defendants. These bills would remove the authority to suspend a driver's license based on a failure to pay fines or fees if the underlying offense is not driving-related. Both bills failed to receive a vote on the House or Senate floor.

## SB 882/HB 579 EVIDENTIARY STANDARDS FOR ACTIONS ARISING DURING AN EMERGENCY

*Employment*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Rodriguez/Rep. Melo*

Independent contractors are a classification of employee that gives workers greater flexibility than a traditional employee, including the ability to set their own hours and choose their clients. However, under state law employers in return for this status are unable to provide certain materials, including personal protective equipment. This bill would remove that restriction during a declared emergency. While HB 579 passed the House, it failed to move in the Senate.

# BILL DESCRIPTIONS

## **SB 758/HB 573 FIDUCIARY DUTY OF CARE FOR APPOINTED PUBLIC OFFICIALS AND OFFICERS**

*Tax and Spending*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. Beltran*

Public officials who manage taxpayer dollars should have the needs of the public in mind when spending their hard-earned money. These bills would help that process by establishing standards for fiduciary duty of care for appointed public officials and executive officers. While the House version passed a floor vote, the Senate bill died in committee.

## **SB 142/HB 6073 INDIVIDUAL WINE CONTAINERS**

*Regulations*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Brandes/Rep. LaMarca*

Current law regulates the size of container that wine must be sold in, limiting consumer choice. This package of bills would remove that regulation, expanding options for those who might want smaller or larger bottles. Unfortunately, neither of these bills advanced to the governor.

## **SB 1370/HB 911 MEDICAL TREATMENT OF ANIMALS**

*Health Care*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Rodriguez/Rep. Buchanan*

Telehealth is a technology not just for humans to improve their medical access, but also potentially for

animals to receive virtual treatment. These bills would expand the services available by telehealth, giving greater health care options for livestock and pets. While the bills had some initial success moving through committees, they ultimately fell short of passing.

## **SB 344/HB 471 LEGISLATIVE REVIEW OF OCCUPATIONAL LICENSES**

*Employment*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. Rizo*

Over the years, various laws have led to nearly 30 percent of Florida's workforce requiring an occupational license to hold their job. These bills would provide a review to ensure that Florida uses the least restrictive measures necessary to address substantiated public health and safety concerns. Unfortunately, neither bill made it through the committee process.

## **SB 894/HB 431 PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS**

*Health Care*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Diaz/Rep. Rommel*

Scope of practice refers to the number of services that qualified health practitioners can provide to consumers. These bills would expand the scope of practice for licensed physician assistants, giving greater health care access to Floridians and greater ability to practice for health care workers. HB 431 was approved by both the House and Senate and sent to the governor.



## **SB 704/HB 757 ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY**

*Corporate Welfare*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Gruters/Rep. Trubuly*

This would create the Film, Television, and Digital Media Targeted Rebate Program, which would provide entertainment companies incentives using tax dollars to produce content in Florida. Government should not be involved in providing corporate welfare using taxpayer money. Fortunately, both the House and Senate versions of the bill died in committee.

## **SB 778/HB 675 FLORIDA TOURISM MARKETING**

*Corporate Welfare*

*Lead Sponsor: Sen. Hooper/Rep. Plasencia*

The Florida Tourism Industry Marketing Corporation, which does business as VISIT FLORIDA, is a state sponsored marketing program that uses taxpayer dollars to advertise for the state as a whole and for specific locations and businesses within Florida. While there are many legitimate actions for government, shooting and placing TV commercials is not one of them, and that money would be better kept with taxpayers. This bill would extend the life of the program indefinitely. Fortunately, neither bill made it out of committee.
